


From the Circuit Office

From The Revd Lin Francis

December 2023

Dear Friends,

A gentleman I knew at work some thirty years ago was obsessed with the lighting up times. The local evening paper was delivered to the company we worked for every day. He would immediately look to see what the lighting up time was for that evening. I was always intrigued by this and particularly heartened with the details once Christmas was over. You might ask, why, then?

I do not like the long dark nights. I much prefer the light evenings when I can be outside, and prefer to travel to and fro in the light. Once the shortest day, 21 December, has gone and the nights draw out, I am happier. I feel more hopeful and positive. When we celebrate Christmas we usually have family or friends around and this helps, but once this is over it is so easy to think of the cold winter weather, and the darkness. For me, just knowing that the spring and summer are coming is wonderful.

Within many of the church council meetings and children's group leaders meetings there has been a lot of talk about light. The Light Parties for 31 October, advent candles and do we have the traditional four red and one white candle or use the different colours and of course talk of having a Christingle Service. Candles, torches and light. Many town and parish councils are also discussing light – Christmas trees and lighting up the high streets. We all need light to cheer us.

The Christingle originates from the Moravian Church which influenced John and Charles Wesley. Johannes de Wattville started the tradition in Germany. It was designed to teach children at Christmas about the Saviour's birth and has been used since 1747. During the service, everyone receives a

Christingle - literally "Christ light" and its meaning is then explained.

The orange represents the world

A candle is Jesus the light of the world

A red ribbon or tape wrapped around the orange symbolises the blood of Jesus

Four sticks holding dried fruit and sweets to signify the four seasons and the gifts we are given in the fruits of the earth

This is a really simple and visual way of appreciating that Jesus is the light of the world; that he can make a very real difference in all our lives. It is also a fun thing which should capture not just the children's attention, but

May the light of Christ put paid to all of your fears, may His light shine in the darkness of your lives and shine among you all, this Christmas. May He enable us to be His light, shining in the darkness of the world at this time.
